From the Rector's Desk

The Righteousness that Exalts

On Wednesday of this week, all of us, citizens and non-citizens alike, will celebrate our nation's independence with a plethora of activities – church services, military parades, flag raising ceremonies, political speeches, concerts, family gatherings and the traditional fireworks display. We will do so despite the uncertainties and unease we face as a nation. Hopefully we will set aside the aforementioned, and truly thank our God for his goodness, mercy and love. I pray that it will be a time of reflection and yes, deep introspection for us as a nation. The writer of Proverbs does remind us that "righteousness exalts a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people (Prov. 14:34). So, if we seek God's favor and continue to expect it, then we have to do what is seen to be pleasing in his sight. The recent announcement of Justice Kennedy's departure from the Supreme Court, has awakened some old debates - think abortion rights, same-sex marriage and other issues we have wrestled with as a nation. I am reminded of something that the German scholar Feurbach said a long time ago — when I am hungry, I have a physical problem, but when my brother is hungry, I've got a spiritual one. We cannot continue to hear of the hurt taking place across our nation and still be at ease. Despite the occasional talk of debt and deficits, we still remain the wealthiest and most powerful nation on the face of the earth and we must use that power and influence for good. I say to you brethren, as we prepare to celebrate Independence Day, let us all pursue righteousness for as the writer of Proverbs reminds us sin is a reproach to any nation.
