Christian Stewardship – A first Look

We have set aside the next three Sundays to reflect collectively as a church family, on the topic of Christian Stewardship, using Sunday January 20, 2019 for the blessing of all submitted pledge cards. On that day, we shall seek to renew our promise to Almighty God, to be better stewards of all he has blessed us with – our Time, Talent and Treasure. I want us to pause and reflect for a moment today on the term "steward". The word originates from scripture, with Jesus himself referring in one of his parables to those (servants/stewards) who were entrusted with their Lord's property. As he explained in that story, these stewards were expected to give an account of what was entrusted to them.

In modern times, stewardship has come to mean, the organized pledging of a specific amount of money to be given regularly to the church. In the early church however, the word was rarely used, since it was widely accepted that the Christian ought to regard the holding of one's property as a trust to be administered on behalf of the needy (Acts 5). Believers were encouraged to give as generously as possible, since they were merely stewards of the bounty of Almighty God. They were exhorted to give so the poor could benefit – and so slowly but surely, the concept of Christian Stewardship began to take shape. This idea gained impetus as the "success preachers" here in America (in the 17th century) encouraged believers to give a percentage of their income to pious causes, reminding their hearers that they were all "stewards of the Lord". It is believed that the need to fund missionaries truly brought about what was called the 'Stewardship Awakening' in the second guarter of the 19th century. Christians from every walk of life, were challenged then to look at their lives, the blessings they had received from a good and gracious God, and to respond accordingly. No one was excused, for both the poor and the affluent were blessed differently. So it was the duty of all to give. Believers were challenged to do so for a practical reason –the church needed money to do its work. Now as Stewardship has evolved overtime, teaching on the subject has sought to address the other aspects of Christian giving – time and talent, recognizing sometimes that that is all people have to give.

SPECIAL PRAYERS

Father, you have made all people with eyes to see you at work in the world, ears to hear you cry out when right suffers wrong, when justice is brought low. Give to the people of our nation courage to stand up for goodness and right-doing in the face of an oppressive spirit, and courage to believe we may restore, in accordance with your gracious will, a light to enlighten the nations and the people with your truth; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. *Amen.*
