FROM THE RECTOR'S DESK

As we await the Lord's Return

It was good to hear one of the gospel stations actually mentioning the word Advent – the season of preparation. Our world has little or no time for the pause the church invites us to observe during Advent, for Christmas can't come fast enough! For us believers, we await not necessarily Christmas, but rather the Lord's return (parousia), as He has promised in his gospel. I found this reflection by Jim Palmer, an ordained minister with a Master of Divinity degree from Trinity Divinity School in Chicago, truly enlightening/alarming I might add. After serving several years as the Senior Pastor of a non-denominational church, he left professional ministerial life on a quest for more authentic spirituality and went on to author five (5) books about his journey. Jim now serves as an adjunct professor in the areas of Ethics and Comparative Religion and as a certified Humanist Chaplain with the American Humanist Association and Co-founder of the Nashville Humanist Association.

So here is a post from Palmer – he says there are ten (10) things about Christianity that Jesus would not be happy about if He returned:-

- **1**. that His vision for a transformed society, got twisted into an afterlife fantasy about heaven.
- **2**. that a religion was formed to worship His name, instead of a movement to advance His message.
- 3. that the gospel says His death solved the problems of humankind's separation from God, instead of accepting that His life revealed the truth that there is no separation from God.
- **4.** that the religion bearing His name was conceived by the theories and doctrines of Paul (the apostle), instead of the truth he Jesus lived and demonstrated.
- 5. that he was said to exclusively be God in the flesh, putting His example out of reach, rather than teaching that we will all share in the same spirit that empowered His character and life.
- **6.** that the religion that claims His name, teaches that his wisdom and teachings are the only legitimate way to know truth and God.
- 7. the idea that humankind stands condemned before God and deserving of Divine wrath and eternal conscious judgment, requiring the death of Jesus to fix it

- **8**. that people are waiting on Jesus to return to save the world and end suffering, rather than taking responsibility for saving the world and solving suffering ourselves.
- **9.** that people think there is a magical potency in uttering the name of Jesus, rather than accessing our own natural powers and capabilities to effect change.
- **10**. that people have come to associate Jesus with church, theology, politics, and power, rather than courage, justice, humanity, beauty, and love.

I am not sure that many of our church scholars will agree with this list. What do you think of it? Fr. Hugh+
