THE LITURGY OF THE PALMS

A silent procession to the altar follows opening prayer.

Celebrant Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord.

People Peace in heaven and glory in the highest.

Celebrant Let us pray.

Almighty and everliving God, source of all wisdom and understanding, be present with those who take counsel in our Diocese of Florida for the renewal and mission of your Church. Teach us in all things to seek first your honor and glory. Guide us to perceive what is right, and grant us both the courage to pursue it and the grace to accomplish it; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

Proclamation of the Palm Gospel (Mark 11:1-11a)

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, "Why are you doing this?' just say this, "The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.' They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.

The celebrant then says the following blessing:

The Lord be with you.

People And also with you.

Celebrant Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People It is right to give him thanks and praise.

Celebrant

It is right to praise you, Almighty God, for the acts of love by which you have redeemed us through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was proclaimed King of Kings by those who spread their garments and branches of palm along his way. Let these branches be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear them in his name, may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns in glory with you and the Holy Spirit, now and forever. *Amen*.

After the palms are blessed, everyone comes and receives theirs before the procession.

Celebrant Let us go forth in peace.

People In the name of Christ. Amen.

As the procession disappears from the view of those at home, Dr. Neil James will lead a brief meditation/reflection reminding us as to why the Christian Church continues to observe Palm Sunday and our Lord's triumphant entry into the Holy City of Jerusalem.

The procession pauses at the door and the celebrant says:

Let us pray:

Almighty God, whose most dear Son went up to joy but first he suffered pain, and entered not into glory before he was crucified: Mercifully grant that we, walking in the way of the cross, may find it none other than the way of life and peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

Then the celebrant proceeds to knock three times saying aloud, "open these doors so that God's people may come in." The doors are opened, and the procession enters the church led by the sacred party and choir. As they enter, the choir leads with the singing of the hymn –Ride on Ride King Jesu

Introduction of new service for Holy Week

On Wednesday of this Week (March 27th) we shall observe the ancient service of Tenebrae (the Latin word for "darkness" or "shadows"). Apart from the "chant" of the Lamentations, the next conspicuous feature of the service is the gradual extinguishing of candles and other lights in the church, until only a single candle considered a symbol of our Lord, remains. Towards the end of the service, this candle is hidden typifying the apparent victory of the forces of evil. At the very end, a loud noise is made, symbolizing the earthquake at the time of the resurrection (Matthew 28:2). The hidden candle is restored to its place and by its light all depart in silence. Join us for this new experience as the conclusion of Lent begins to unfold. *Fr. Hugh+*

FROM THE RECTOR'S DESK

Approaching Holy Week

Today marks the beginning of Holy Week, a time when most of us practicing Anglo-Catholics seek to focus more on our Lord's Cross and Passion. There is absolutely nothing that closely compares with the liturgies of Holy Week and Easter! In addition to the Stations of the Cross devotional service (to be done via zoom this time) we have added Tenebrae (shadows and darkness), with its series of revelatory passages of scripture, coupled with the usage of fourteen candles on the altar. Come experience this new liturgical service (not really new) for us here at SMAA, as we wind down our Lenten Observance. Perhaps these days, the mass of the Last Supper (Maundy Thursday) and Good Friday do not quite receive the same level of devotion they were previously afforded. I still remember (as a child) not wanting to miss the stripping of the Altar and the procession to the Altar of Repose yes with the bare altar staring back at us congregants, as we entered the church building for the three hours of worship on Good Friday, a service that included the proclamation of the Seven Last Words, the Veneration of the Cross and the Communion of the Pre-Sanctified (from the altar of repose). And then we returned on Holy Saturday to watch the Sanctuary Guild "bring back to life", the altar with floral decorations that went missing during Lent. Oh, for the old days! Some feel that we have sacrificed the solemnity of the final weeks of our Lord's life for sacred concerts and other more attractive events, thinking that no one really will sit through what those observances previously provided. A colleague of mine, Dr. Douglas Dupree, commented recently that the Good Friday rite in particular, always brought home the centrality of our Lord's sacrifice, as the service mirrored the three hours he hung languishing on the cross before saying—"It is Finished". Doug tells a somewhat amusing story about his sister-in- law visiting Grace Episcopal Church to observe what Episcopalians do on Good Friday (she is Lutheran) As they entered, Fr. Kurt Dunkle lay prostrate at the foot of the Cross, unmoving. Where upon, she grabbed Doug's arm, urging him to call 911, for she thought Fr. Kurt had passed out! This is what is done in those churches that still maintain the rites of this Holy Day with the priest lying face down in complete adoration, humility and total abasement. The poor woman was not comfortable until Fr. Dunkle rose to his knees! Also I came across this interesting article in the Anglican Digest this past week, in which the Rt. Rev. Brian K. Burgess tells the story of uncomfortably inviting a friend of his to Holy Week. This friend was serving as a county sheriff and happened to be at the FBI National Academy in Quantico, Virginia for their Spring graduation exercises. Bishop Burgess, realizing that his friend was largely unchurched, issued the invitation in a "pastorally sensitive manner" explaining how the approaching weeks encompassed the Paschal Triduum. His friend did show up for the Good Friday service which included the silent procession, the reading of the Passion Gospel, the Chanting of the Solemn Collects, Veneration of The Cross and Communion from the altar of Repose. He said what his friend experienced was a bare church devoid of adornments, allowing him to focus on the cross and the altar (even the cushions were removed from the Chancel rail, making kneeling somewhat challenging). The Bishop concluded, we lose sight of the essence of Easter when we have no concept of what it is we are being saved from! In a world that is intoxicated with Easter candy rather than Easter communion, where images of holiness are censored but vulgarity and moral depravity are not, death and new birth both still involve blood, sweat and tears. For a county sheriff who has experienced the worst of the worst when it comes to the human condition, and who by default has been given secular responsibility for broken and fractured lives, the Bishop was thankful to Almighty God that his friend experienced the proper liturgy for Good Friday. Why? Because this is where the very worst of our secular lives is turned into the sacred.
